

Conquer the rapids Costa Rica's rivers swell during rainy season, so the best time to raft is from May to October. Rivers are graded; slow currents are classed as one or two, while six is the most challenging. Nervous? Then avoid ones with names like The Terminator (on Sarapiquí) or El Abismo (on Reventazón). Novices might want to try Peñas Blancas or Balsa, where you may spot herons, sloths and monkeys.

If you want to shake things up, opt for Savegre, which has calmer spots interspersed with rapids. Alternatively, paddle hell for leather on Río Toro, which is class two to four. Save Pacuare for last, as it's voted among the world's best rivers for white-water rafting. You can snake along its 108km length from the Talamanca mountains to the Caribbean - as long as you survive its double drop rapids, that is!

Fly through the trees Central America's longest zipline (1,590m) awaits at 100% Aventura in Monteverde. This is a heart-racing way to see the misty cloud forest and you will whizz down 11 ziplines before reaching the grand finale: Tarzan's Swing, which will drop you to the ground 45m below. A little further north of Monteverde is La Fortuna, where you can zipline with the backdrop of Arenal volcano.

Another nine ziplines and 13 platforms await in Costa Rica's south in Montezuma, at the southern tip of the Nicoya Peninsula. Zip through the brocolli-green canopy, pausing at each of the platforms to soak up the incredible views of the surrounding mountains and the glittering Pacific Ocean. You may even spot capuchin monkeys and colourful parrots (such as macaws), while the sounds of howler monkeys will echo through the trees. When your feet are back on solid ground, be sure to explore the many waterfalls of Montezuma and cool off in their natural pools.

Swim with sharks
Whether you're an advanced diver or a first timer, there are plenty of underwater spots, teeming with sharks, that are suited to your level. Novices should head under the water at Drake Bay where reef sharks can be seen along with orcas, humpbacks and pilot whales.

More experienced? Travel
30m below the surface at
Bat Island, the only place
in Costa Rica where you
can experience bull sharks.
Advanced certified divers can
sail out to the far-flung Cocos
Island, south-west of the mainland.
This remote outpost is world-famous
for its hundreds of hammerhead
sharks and huge tiger sharks.

# Gaze in awe at volcanoes

Costa Rica'a north is home to five active volcanoes. To admire the most photogenic, visit La Fortuna, where you can combine gawping at the symmetrical cone of the 1,657m-high Arenal volcano with jungle treks. After stretching your legs, take a dip in one of the many hot spring pools and apply natural clay body masks made with volcanic ash. Then tick off the other active volcanoes


on the list – Poás, Rincón de la Vieja, Turrialba and, of course, Costa Rica's highest volcano, the 3,432m Irazú, the closest to the capital, San José.

Don't underestimate the thrill factor of dormant volcanoes either. Catarata Del Toro awaits exploration in the less-visited Central Valley. Listen to the crash of the waterfall from the top and feel its spray on your face as you descend into the 90m crater of an extinct volcano.




Over 90% of all organisms in a rainforest are found in the canopy, so what better place for a jungle adventure? At the Sky Walk at Monteverde Cloud Forest, six suspension bridges join together to form a 2.5km trail through Monteverde's canopy. Follow a tour guide across the knee-shakingly high bridges while learning about the native flora and fauna.

For an extra thrilling adventure, embark on a jungle trek in the dark. In both Monteverde and Manuel Antonio NP, you can join a guide for a night walk. While your sight will be diminished, your other senses will come alive: the smell of the damp on the jungle floor; the high-pitch buzz of the insects; the low grunts of the toads. The forest never sleeps so expect to see bright tree frogs, huge snakes and tarantulas.

# **SUSTAINABILITY**



Stay in an eco-lodge The first step to sustainable travel? Book yourself into an eco-lodge, preferably one with a Certificate of Sustainable Tourism (CST). They exist in harmony with their surroundings and offer low-impact adventures galore. Near Corcovado National Park, Lapa Rios Lodge is surrounded by primary forest - which puts waterfall hikes, birdwatching safaris and whale-watching right

on your doorstep. But the southeast has a wealth of award-winning accommodation: visitors to the Luna Lodge, Tiskita Jungle Lodge, Playa Cativo Lodge or Casa Corcovado Jungle Lodge - to name just a few - will find themselves enjoying the balance of comfort with lush wilderness; while you're in the Golfo Dulce, Playa Nicuesa makes a fine base for kayaking, snorkelling and dolphin-watching.

On the east coast, Selva Bananito Lodge offers horse-riding, treeplanting and even gyrocopter experiences, while Rio Tropicales in Limon is perfect for white-water rafting on the nearby Pacuare River.

Approaching the northern border, at Hotel Capitán Suizo in Tamarindo, you can spy macaws, snorkel and watch whales while at Laguna del Lagarto Rainforest Lodge, near the Rio San Carlos, you can spy criticallyendangered great green macaws in their natural habitat.

Volunteer your time Whether it's for a few days or an entire fortnight, volunteering can make a real difference - and Costa Rica has a wealth of wildlifefocused projects.

Las Pumas Rescue Centre offers rewarding volunteering programmes for wildlife - especially big cat enthusiasts. Located just outside Cañas, the centre rescues and rehabilitates animals, providing care in their natural habitats. The centre offers volunteering positions for people interested in learning about the conservation of wildlife for a minimum stay of one and a half months. There's never more than eight volunteers at the centre at one time, so you need to be prepared to get your hands dirty.

Eat at an eco-farm There are many places you can visit in Costa Rica to see how farmers use natural remedies instead of chemicals to protect their crops. For example, Costa Rican farmers will plant a colourful flower they know certain pests don't like instead of spraying their crops with pesticides.

You can see this in action at the Finca Educativa Don Juan. You can visit for the day or spend a night or two. You will get a tour of the

farm and be treated to a feast of locally grown vegetables, beans and homemade salsas.

Or try Hacienda El Viejo, which offers mangrove tours and gives you the chance to infuse your own rum.

Protect the wild Conservation projects dedicated to protecting the country's diverse flora and fauna can be found all over Costa Rica. And since many of them rely on money from 99% of Costa Rica's energy supply is enewable, and it aims visitors, the best way you can offer support is to become entirely by going to see them.

carbon-neutral by 2050. The Rescate Wildlife Rescue Center (Also known as ZooAve) in Alajuela is just one example, and has spent over 30 years rehabilitating animals. Visit to see over 125 species including sloths, jaguar and pumas. Meanwhile, the Fundecodes volunteer programme aids flora research in six areas across the north-west's Tempisque Conservation Area.

Visit Pacuare Reserve on Costa Rica's east coast and join in with a walk of the coastline during turtle nesting and hatching season to help protect leatherback turtles - you can even assist with the morning count of new hatchlings.

# Take the pledge

Costa Rica is serious about protecting the environment and it wants to make sure its visitors are, too. The Pura Vida Pledge is a four-step plan that ensures more sustainable travelling.




The third step is volunteering. Step four is quite simply about respecting the environment - so ensure you leave no trace. ▶

# NATURE & WILDLIFE



Go wild in the jungle
The undeniable star of Costa
Rica's jungles are sloths. They
may be slow moving, but that doesn't
make them any easier to see. These
smiling creatures live all over Costa
Rica, one of the few countries that
have both the two- and three-toed
species. Other cute, common
mammals you're likely to see in
the jungles of Costa Rica are tapir,
peccary and coati – a racoon-like

animal the size of a large cat. They're most often spotted around Arenal and Monteverde.

Look out for iguana in the Osa Peninsula, Arenal Volcano and Tortuguero National Park and don't miss Jesus Christ lizards walking on water at Cahuita National Park. Bigger reptiles can be seen in the jungle rivers, swamps and lagoons, which you can tour to uncover crocodiles and caimans. Head to Corcovado to spot ocelots and margay cats. If you hire a guide – and if you get lucky – you might spot a jaguar in Corcovado in the biodiverse Osa Peninsula. While there's only thought to be around 30 of these cats left in this area, Osa boasts 2.5% of the entire planet's biodiversity.

Monkey business

The first time you're woken by the booming roars and shouts

of howler monkeys is when you really know you're in jungle territory. Staying in eco-lodges or family run accommodation on the edge of the parks is the best way to immerse yourself. Once there, you can explore with guides, wildlife-spotting by boat in Tortuguero on the east, for example, or by foot in Manuel Antonio Park on the west.

Alongside howler monkeys, you're also likely to see capuchin, squirrel and spider: tick all four species off in Corcovado NP. Watching them swing through the trees, sometimes with a baby clinging on, is mesmerising.

Turtle nesting
You won't be the only one
enjoying Costa Rica's pristine
beaches – a well-timed visit will see
you enjoy watching turtles digging,
laying and burying their eggs on the
beach. It's always best to see them
with an official guide to ensure you
don't scare them.

Four turtle species can be found in Costa Rica. Leatherbacks are the largest and they love eating jellyfish. See them nesting between March and July on the Caribbean coast and between September and March on the Pacific coast. Green turtles

are the species' only herbivores; they nest between June and October in Tortuguero NP. Olive ridleys are the most abundant and they nest all year round on the Pacific Coast. To see endangered hawksbill, head to Cahuita NP (Sept to Oct). Visitors to Ostional beach between August and November could see up to 300,000 sea turtles arriving.

A birder's paradise Bird watchers dream of seeing the vibrant year-round birdlife of Costa Rica. There are more bird species here than anywhere else in the world - more than 900. Visit in dry season (Jan-Apr) and you'll see herons, ducks and spoonbills around water and scarlet macaws in Manuel Antonio, Corcovado, Carara and Palo Verde National Parks. Hummingbirds breed November to March, so listen out for their calls around Arenal and in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve. You can see toucans there too, as well as in Manuel Antonio, Corcovado and Tortuguero national parks.

Sunbitterns can be seen in La Marta
Wildlife Refuge close to Tapanti NP.
Intrepid twitchers should also look
out for fasciated tiger-heron,
black-and-yellow tanager

and russet antshrike. The most exotic bird has to be the resplendent quetzal: small with iridescent greenand-red colouring and long tail feathers, they can be found in the Monteverde Cloud Forest and Los Quetzales NP (Feb to May).

# Under the sea

Be sure to explore off land, too. You can see migratory humpback whales almost all year round at Marino Ballena NP; they have two seasons – from mid-July to mid-Nov and mid-Dec to April. You'll likely spot dolphins, too as Costa Rica's waters are teeming with them. The Pacific coast is home to bottlenose, Risso's, rough-toothed, spinner and striped dolphins while on the Caribbean side you can find costero and bottlenose dolphins.

Those prepared to go deeper should dive during the dry season, when the water is at its clearest. Huge manta rays can be seen off the Catalina Islands (Dec to May) while Drake Bay's Cano Island hides an underwater world of bright corals, eels, reef sharks and sting rays. Beginners can test their skills at Manuel Antonio NP where turtles, octopus, lobsters and whitetip sharks await. ▶

# Get a caffeine fix

Since being to introduced to Costa Rica in the late 1700s, coffee has become one of Costa Rica's top exports. By law, the country only grows 100% Arabica beans; Coffee grows in eight regions; among these, Tarrazú is thought to produce the highest quality beans, known for their strong aroma and vanilla, cocoa and caramel notes. There are many coffee experiences available around Costa

Rica. One good option is La Montaña Tarrazú plantation. As well as sampling a cup of fresh Joe you can ask a coffee producer about the difference between washed coffee - when the cherry is removed before the bean is dried - and naturally processed coffee, when the fruit is removed after the drying process. Honey processed coffee is somewhere in-between, as part of the pulp is left on for a sweeter flavour.

**Cowboy culture** The Nicoya Peninsula is home to the sabaneros -Costa Rica's cowboys. Don a cowboy hat and join them on horseback to herd cattle: a hands-on way to experience their way of life and gain an understanding of the deep connection they have with nature. Help them to wash and feed the horses before hearing more stories of this fascinating culture around their dinner table. Hacienda El Viejo in the northern wetlands is a good place to start.

Meet the Bri Bri The Bri Bri live in a protected reserve in the mountains near Cahuita, off the Caribbean coast. The indigenous group maintain a traditional way of life, speaking their own language, making bows and arrows for archery, and hunting for fish.

Embark on a tour to the Yorking river - or Yorkín - part of the Sixaola River that marks part of the border between Costa Rica and Panama. After a trip in a wooden canoe, you'll arrive on the indigenous territory, where cocoa and medicinal plants grow alongside corn, plantain and cassava. Dinner is cooked on an open fire, and you'll sleep in a thatched hut.

From bean to bar Go on a chocolate tour in La Fortuna to see coffee growing alongside sugar cane and avocado.

It has not had an army since 1948. You'll see the whole journey from bean to bar. Pick the pod from the cacao plant and suck on the fruit until you get down to the bean. The beans are then sun-dried and roasted over a fire before being crushed by a stone and grinded into a chocolate paste. You'll then have a chance to make your own chocolate

truffles - the perfect souvenir.

**Food for thought** Costa Rica's cuisine reflects the history and diversity of the country. Visitors to San José should check out the buzzing Barrio Escalante to enjoy the eclectic culinary experiences on offer.

Beyond the capital, head to Costa Rica's Caribbean side to enjoy rondón - a seafood stew filled with coconut milk and plantain. Olla de carne is another Costa Rican classic a beef stew bursting with potatoes and vegetables. Rice and beans are a staple and gallo pinto is usually served for breakfast alongside eggs and fried plantain.

It should come as no surprise that seafood features heavily here. Ceviche, a raw dish flavoured with lime is a refreshing meal on a hot day while a pescado entero - literally a whole fried fish - is rather satisfying after a day of hiking. The Pacific side isn't just worth seeking out for its seafood: it's established on the cooking scene for fusing Latin tastes with flavours from around the world.



# WELLBEING



Yogis should head to the northeastern Nosara region, famous for its wellness retreats. With its long stretches of golden sands and expanses of forests, you'll soon see why it is so easy to relax here. At Nosara's Harmony Hotel, guests can combine morning yoga sessions with soothing surf lessons on the waves that lap Guiones Beach. Cala Luna in Guanacaste is surrounded by

greenery; the hotel offers yoga classes as well as sound therapy, reiki and other holistic treatments to soothe both body and mind. The boutique Lagarta Lodge meanwhile sits in a privately owned biological reserve.

Over on Costa Rica's Caribbean side, Samasati Yoga and Wellness Retreat offers swaying hammocks, surfing and yoga in the laidback coastal town of Puerto Viejo. With meditation classes, yoga and

breathwork all on the cards, you're bound to leave feeling rejuvenated.

Farm-to-table food Being mindful about what you put in your body is easy in Costa Rica due to the bounty of fresh fruit and vegetables available.

To learn about seasonal ingredients in Costa Rica's cuisine, join a course led by a local. Try the cooking class experience at Casa Turire, which



organises lessons with a local Turrialba valley chef. Once you've picked vegetables and herbs from their organic garden, you'll learn traditional recipes and then sample your creations.

**Hot springs** Costa Rica's position on the Pacific Ring of Fire means it has an explosive history and volcanic topography. The result of all this geothermal activity? Natural, mineral-rich hot springs where you can relax and feel your aches melt away into the bath-like water.

A good place to relax in the hot springs is along the Tabacon River where a series of deep pools allow you to have a warm soak while

listening to the sounds of the jungle. Meanwhile, on the Orosi River, the luxurious Hacienda Orosi awaits a thermal mineral spa where steam rises from the myriad hot pools. The water here is rich in calcium, magnesium and potassium and can reach temperatures of up to 38°C. Recline in one of the many pools while admiring the view of the surrounding green hills and valleys.

**Forest bathing** With 30 national parks all hiding numerous well-marked trails, there are countless places to unwind on a mindful stroll in Costa Rica. Forest bathing (the art of finding calm among the trees) comes naturally here and you'll soon feel connected to the bountiful nature all around you on a jungle hike.

Don't miss Manuel Antonio National Park to find walking trails that take you past mangrove swamps, tropical plants and up to the Escondido viewpoint where you can look out over the Pacific Ocean. Similarly, as one of Central America's largest lowland tropical rainforests, Corcovado NP allows you to refresh vourself in nature.

At Tenorio Volcano NP, the cloud forest can be explored on foot via the many walking routes. One of the highlights is the hour's hike to

the Celeste River and waterfall. where you are led across hanging bridges over a brilliantly blue river to a waterfall cascading into a turquoise pool.

The beaches There's nothing much more relaxing than feeling the sand between your toes and with over 300 beaches to choose from in Costa Rica, the only stress will be deciding which stretch of sand to take your shoes and socks off for.

On the Pacific Coast, Guanacaste has been called 'The Golden Coast' thanks to its sunsets. Visitors sit on the beach waiting for that sensational moment when the sky becomes gilted.

Over on the Caribbean side, Punta Uva beach is great for snorkelling with colourful coral just under the surface. A walk along the sand will reveal the laidback atmosphere of this small fishing town.




